AGM

The Annual General Meeting was held on Monday 18th March. The accounts were approved and the Committee was re-elected. Two new members of the Committee were appointed, Huw Mitchell and Richard Goddard (co-opted). After the formal business was completed we had a very enjoyable quiz on local history.

Spring History Meeting

We were fortunate in having three academics from Swansea University who were all experts on women in medieval life.

Dr Laura Kalas who has recently edited a book on Margery Kempe, a wellknown mystic who died in 1440, gave us a talk on medieval women and mysticism. Pine cones were a central feature of her talk! They were thought of as being omniferous, bearing all, and associated with the heart and with Christ. There is a huge bronze statue of one in the Vatican which is believed to have been mentioned by Dante.

Dr Emma Cavell talked on Medieval Women in the Anglo-Welsh Borders. She argued that aristocratic women, particularly Maud Mortimer, were influential in the fall of Llywelyn ap Gruffudd and the domination of the English.

Prof Liz McAvoy spoke about women and anchorism in the middle ages. Many widows of noblemen found safety in being an anchoress. Dedication to the religious life provided peace and security for them at a time of turmoil. As a pathway to heaven it was a superior female alternative to male warfare.
